#### Smile Squad is coming to this school

The Smile Squad team from Bendigo Health are coming to our school in March 2024.

Smile Squad is the Victorian Government free school dental program.

This means all students can get a free dental check-up, preventive services, and treatment at school.

#### How to access free dental care

We need your consent before we can provide services. Consent is usually provided by a parent or guardian.

Paper copies of the consent form are available. Please contact the school office if you would like to request one.

The electronic consent form can be translated into more than 100 languages, and the paper form is available in 13 languages.

#### **Smile Squad dental packs**

All children deserve a healthy smile, and the Smile Squad free school dental program is working hard to help make sure this happens.

Your child(ren) will soon receive a free dental pack to bring home. The dental pack contains a tooth-brush, full sized toothpaste, and an oral health brochure. Please take the time to read the brochure. It's full of helpful hints and tips to help your whole family eat well, drink well and clean well – for life.

Smile Squad provides standard strength fluoride toothpaste that is generally used by ages six and over, unless recommended by a dental or trained health professional.

If your child is under six, please talk to a dental or trained health professional to find out if your child might benefit from using this toothpaste. You can also choose to put the toothpaste away until they turn six or give it to someone else in your family to use.

#### Do I need to attend my child's appointment?

No, you do not need to attend your child's appointment. You can attend if you would like to, and you can take your child to the community dental clinic if you prefer.

### AROUND THE CLASSROOMS

#### **Grade 2/3:**

The Grade 2/3 classroom have been busy this week, building their knowledge and understanding of how to write complex sentences. We have learnt about subordinating conjunctions, using the acronym AAWWUBBIS (pronounced AHH-WHOO-BIS). By using one of the subordinating conjunctions, we can form an independent clause (a sentence that makes sense on its own) and a dependent clause (a sentence that provides extra information, but does not make sense on its own), to form a complex sentence that will engage our readers. I look forward to reading how the students will use this new writing skill in their narrative stories, to which we will start next week. In Maths, we finished our unit on addition with the addition algorithm. We learnt how to write our numbers vertically into columns according to their place value. This allows students to understand addition with regrouping, when we cross the tens boundary.

In the lead up to our Earth Ed excursion next Friday, the Grade 2/3 students got to experience what it means to be an engineer (the E for engineering in STEM). We read the wonderful book by author Andrea Beaty, Rosie Revere, Engineer, and designed our own flying contraption. Students set to work designing and constructing their contraption, just like Rosie did in the book for her great aunt Rose.














### Grade 5/6

Last week we finally finished our class novel 'War Horse' by Michael Murpurgo. Students have completed their own review of the book to add to our classroom wall. I have included some examples from Sid and Ami on the next page. We have begun to read the picture book version of the story, also written by Michael Murpurgo. Only a few pages in, students are finding some interesting differences. In the next couple of weeks, we hope to watch the movie as well. A letter will be sent home shortly detailing rating information and asking for consent.

# MPS HOUSE CROSS COUNTRY 2024 INFORMATION

This year our House Cross Country event will be held on the last day of Term 1, Thursday March 28<sup>th</sup>.

This is a whole school event and all students will compete to earn points for their house, **Hollows**, **Chisolm** or **Freeman**. If you are unsure of your house, please see Jan or your classroom teacher.

Students will walk down to the Malmsbury Cricket Ground as a whole school for the event at 9:15 after morning classroom routines. The following events will be held:

- Prep/Year 1 Fun Run around the inside of the oval, 1 lap, approximately 500m
- Year 2 Fun Run around the inside of the oval, 2 laps, approximately 1km
- 9 and 10 year olds 2km track
- 11 and 12/13 year olds 3km track

Age groups are calculated as age turned by Dec 31 2024. The attached map shows the track, 2 laps for 9 and 10 year olds and 3 laps for 11 and 12/13 year olds.

Students will have their morning snack at the oval and we will return to school for lunch then 2:30pm dismissal. House colours can be worn, however clothing needs to be appropriate to run in and SunSmart with shoulders covered.

I have spoken with students about training ideas if they are interested. This could involve:

- Visiting the cricket ground and running the track
- Going for a jog at home on an family agreed route
- Running laps of the school oval during recess or lunch time

Closer to the date I will be asking for parent volunteers to stand at checkpoints so please check your calendars and keep it free to come along and support our students!





### SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally formed bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within centrally provided guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

For 2024, school council elections must be completed by March 31st.

School Council members are elected to serve for a period of 2 years. This year we have the following members whose 2 year tenure is coming to a close:

This means that there will be a call for nominations for 4 parent positions to be filled for the next 2 years (Community Members are appointed through a different system). Vacating councillors are more than welcome to nominate for the positions again. If there are more nominations than vacant positions, we will then work through a voting process to appoint people to the positions.

# Coliban Creatures Walk & Talk - Thursday, April 11 · 5am - 7pm Lauriston Public Hall & Community Centre

Are you interested in learning more about the platypus in the Coliban River catchment?

Keen to know more about their habitat and river restoration?

North Central CMA is hosting a platypus walk and talk evening with ecologist Josh Griffiths to present the most recent Coliban River environmental DNA sampling results.

The Coliban catchment boasts strong platypus populations, and a long-term river restoration project known as A Healthy Coliban Catchment is underway.

The project aims to restore native habitat and riparian connectivity within the rivers and creeks of the upper Coliban catchment, from the headwaters to Malmsbury Reservoir.

A goal of the project is ensuring species such as platypus and river blackfish have a thriving environment to call home.

This event is for anyone interested in knowing more about the platypus, its habitat, behaviours, diet, and population.

Josh has been sampling the Coliban River for the presence of platypus, native fish, and other species since 2017 and will share plenty of stories from near and far, about working with one of Australia's most iconic critters.

Josh has spent the last 17 years specialising in platypus research throughout Australia. This has included the development and verification of eDNA as a new method that has revolutionised the way we can monitor platypus populations
