NAPLAN Results Year 3 & 5 Students- Upcoming changes to NAPLAN reporting

Ahead of NAPLAN results for students being released from Monday 17 July 2023, I'm writing to inform you of some changes to this year's reporting. These are changes being introduced nationally by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA).

NAPLAN will continue to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation but the results will now be presented in 4 proficiency levels:

These are:

- · exceeding
- · strona
- · developing
- · needs additional support.

This change will give schools, parents and carers clearer information that details student achievement against new proficiency levels.

Students' NAPLAN reports will continue to show how they are tracking against their peers and provide an indication of their skill levels against national averages and where we would expect them to be in order to get the most out of schooling. This provides valuable information to teachers about how we can continue to support your child

Each set of NAPLAN results is an important milestone but it's also important that students know that one result does not define them – these results are about making sure every student gets the support they need so they can continue to get the best from their learning.

When we provide you with your results, you will also receive information about what the new proficiency levels mean.

AROUND THE CLASSROOMS

Grade Prep/1:

We have a fantastic start to Term 3, everyone is keen and ready to learn, we must of all had a restful, relaxing break! In Literacy we are writing our own book, 'The Very Hungry Tadpole'. Yes, we are becoming authors and publishers! In Maths, we are looking at place value, which is a tricky concept, but we are getting it and learning the difference between the meaning of a digit and a number. Again, very tricky concept, but once we grasp it, we are well on the way to being great Mathematicians!

Also, a BIG welcome to Iversen She is a new Grade One student, who has fitted into our class beautifully! I am very proud of the way our inclusive Turtles have welcomed and included Iversen into every part of MPS!



Grade 2/3:

This week in the grade 2/3 classroom, in Science, we have been learning about how things grow, change and have similar offspring to themselves. We have also been learning about, how living things have different life cycles and depend on each other and the environment to survive. This week we looked out our own life cycle and how we have developed from birth to childhood and how we may look as an adult. Next week we will be looking at our facial features and how they have changed from when we were a baby. I have asked the children to bring a photo in or email a photo in of themselves when they were a baby. We are going to be looking at these baby photos next week and using the facial features to guess who each photo belongs to. I look forward to seeing all the baby photos and how much all the children have changed over the years.

Grade 3/4:

This week in Grade 3/4 we have been working on persuasive writing and have had a particular focus on persuasive devices. Emotive language, exaggeration and rhetorical questions have been our focus for this week. We have produced a number of strong and engaging persuasive writing pieces using these devices.

Grade 5/6:

This week in the 5/6 classroom we have introduced the idea of having a growth mindset and put this into practice with difficult and collaborative tasks. It has been fantastic to see everyone willing to take on challenging tasks and encouraging their peers to do their best.

For Science this term, we will be exploring microorganisms. On Monday we investigated the effect of yeast on different types of bread. The students really enjoyed describing the texture, smell and especially taste! Our Humanities focus for this term is Economics and Business. We began the topic by researching consumer fads from the past and by the end of the lesson, we had all learnt some very interesting facts about furbies, pet rocks and marbles.

The round will also include a smoking ceremony to provide a deeper understanding of Indigenous culture and history.



Are you eligible for help with child care fees?

From July 2023, Child Care Subsidy (CCS) is increasing. Some families previously not eligible will now get it.

The changes mean early childhood education and care is now more affordable for more families

Making early childhood education and care more affordable has benefits for children and their families. communities and Australia.

More families will be eligible

Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care.

What you need to know



The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from 85% to 90% for families earning \$80,000 or less.



Families earning over \$80,000 and under \$530,000 may get a subsidy 90% starting from 90%. Depending on their income, the subsidy will go down by 1% for each \$5,000 of income they earn.



The income limit for CCS is increasing to \$530,000 a year. This means more families will be eligible.



Families earning below \$362,408 with more than one child aged 5 or under in care can get a higher rate of CCS for one or more of their children.



Families with Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight for that child. This is regardless of their family's activity level.

What you need to do

If your family earns below \$530,000 you may be entitled to CCS from 10 July. Check your eligibility for CCS by making a claim using your Centrelink online account through myGov or your Express Plus Centrelink mobile app.

If you have an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander child

From 10 July 2023, families can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight for each Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander child in their care and attending child care. Families may get more than 36 hours of subsidy per fortnight based on their circumstances and the amount of recognised activity they do.

If you would like to get at least 36 hours of subsidised care, you should contact Services Australia to update your child's CCS details. It's voluntary for you to tell Services Australia this. For more information go to Services Australia
