## A FDCUS DN STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Over the next 4 weeks, we are having a focused 'Blitz' around attendance. With the Cold and Flu Season upon us, we have seen a drop in our overall attendance across the past few weeks.

To help get things back on track, we will be having a strong focus on attendance. Each week, I will be presenting each class with their percentage attendance. At the end of the 4 Week Blitz, the class with the highest attendance percentage will win a The Classroom Attendance Reward.

Currently the reward options that have been floated by students are things such as an hour of Free Time, Classroom Movie, but the most popular by far is the chance to drench me with water balloons or to dress me all in white and decorate me with coloured powder. All options I am more than happy to be a part of.

## Once the cycle of absence starts, it is very difficult to stop

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.
It can be hard for your student to return to school, as they get behind in their work and miss out on new topics. Students are also likely to lose touch with friendship groups and feel on the 'outer'.

The opposite is also true. With increased attendance, they are more connected to their peers, develop their sense of belonging, are more comfortable and willing to take risks with their learning, and become more resilient individuals when faced with challenges.

Below is a table that outlines a guide around the effect of varying attendance percentages.

## Grade Prep/1:

What a wonderful week we have had in the Prep/One room! Loads of celebrations for 'finally' celebrating the first 100 days of learning for our Preppies, only 14 days late! But celebrate we did! Along with our whole school dress up celebrations, we had a few '100' challenges. Firstly, we had to find 100 smiley faces hidden around the room, we found 95 !

## AROUND THECLASSROOMS

## Grade 2/3:

We continued on with our writing this week, as we focused on punctuation, expression and the use of our own voices in our writing. This week we wrote a letter to Travis, stating our reasoning and expressing our thoughts as to why we should, or should not have to wear school uniform. It was wonderful to see how expressive they can be, when they have a reason to argue their point.

## Grade 3/4:

This week in $3 / 4$ we have been working on developing our inferring skills. We have been looking at taking what the author says and working out what information we can take away that they are leading us to but not specifically saying. We have enjoyed apply these skills to a variety of different texts by Australian Authors.

## Grade 5/6:

This week in the $5 / 6$ classroom we have been developing our writing skills by using a variety of strategies. Students have been looking back on their old work, picking out important sentences, and using their new skills to improve fluency.
In numeracy, we have begun exploring different types of angles, this took us outside in the sun to do an angle scavenger hunt.
Students have also been researching a country of their choice and have begun gathering the information into Google Slides. Many students have asked if this is something that they can work on at home. This is not necessary, but students are welcome to access Google Classrooms at home. I will be sending home instructions to log into Google Classrooms with their individual login details.

# Are you eligible for help with child care fees? 

From July 2023, Child Care Subsidy (CCS) is increasing. Some families previously not eligible will now get it.


What you need to know

The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from $85 \%$ to $90 \%$ for families earning $\$ 80,000$ or less.

Families earning over $\$ 80,000$ and under $\$ 530,000$ may get a subsidy starting from 90\%. Depending on their income, the subsidy will go down by $1 \%$ for each $\$ 5,000$ of income they earn.

The income limit for CCS is increasing to $\$ 530,000$ a year. This means more families will be eligible.

Families earning below $\$ 362,408$ with more than one child aged 5 or under in care can get a higher rate of CCS for one or more of their children.

Families with Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight for that child. This is regardless of their family's activity level.

## What you need to do

If your family earns below $\mathbf{\$ 5 3 0 , 0 0 0}$ you may be entitled to CCS from 10 July. Check your eligibility for CCS by making a claim using your Centrelink online account through myGov or your Express Plus Centrelink mobile app.

If you have an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander child From 10 July 2023, fomilies can get at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight for each Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander child in their care and attending child care. Families may get more than 36 hours of subsidy per fortnight based on their circumstances and the amount of recognised activity they do.
If you would like to get at least 36 hours of subsidised care, you should contact Services Australia to update your child's CCS details. It's voluntary for you to tell Services Australia this. For more information go to Services Australia
